



On 1 March 2021, the High-Level Pledging Event for Yemen, co-hosted by the United Nations and the Governments of Sweden and Switzerland, was convened virtually, bringing together representatives of Member States, International Organizations, UN Agencies, NGOs and civil society to raise funding to meet the humanitarian needs in Yemen. During the event, the Supervisor General of King Salman Humanitarian Aid and Relief Centre (KSrelief), Dr. Abdullah Al Rabeeah, announced the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia's pledge of USD 430 million to support Yemen's Humanitarian Response Plan 2021.
















afidha Ali Yaseen, 40, was displaced, along with her husband and five children, from the Hais district of the Al Hudaydah governorate to the Ja'ar district of the Abyan governorate. They have been suffering from displacement, poverty, and the inability to secure food.

"We used to live a decent life in our home, but now we are unable to provide for the basic needs of our family. We have lost everything now, and we can hardly find something to eat," Hafidha says, as the feeling of grief overwhelms her. Hafidha toiled on the land, laboring in the fields of neighboring farms for meager pay that did not even meet their basic daily needs. "I have to go to work even when I am sick, because if I stayed home, my family would have nothing to eat" she explains. Sometimes her family has to sleep without a bite to silence the rumbling of their empty stomachs.

KSrelief strives to support Yemen's most vulnerable households and to empower affected families like Hafidha's through our partnership with the UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO). As part of a project aimed to improve availability and access to food for 70,000 households, Hafidha and her family received 10 egg-laying chickens, transforming poultry into a tangible source of income for them.

"The chickens have been a huge help to us," she says. "Now, I cook dinner for my family so that they don't go to bed on an empty stomach. And sometimes when there are enough eggs, I sell some to buy vegetables or fruit." Moreover, Hafidha no longer has to endure hard labor on farms in extreme heat every day. "Now," she says with delight, "I can go to work whenever I want to, as my children regularly have something to eat. Actually, I had always dreamt of breeding chickens, and now my dream has come true!"

With KSrelief's support, FAO is currently empowering the most vulnerable households in six Yemeni governorates, including Hajjah, Amran, Taiz, Lahj, Abyan, and Ad Dhale. Through this project, hundreds of thousands of Yemenis will be able to restore their livelihoods through income-generating activities, agricultural production support and livestock protection assistance.
